Since its founding in 1949, the Peninsula Sports Club has been an active force on the sports scene. The 1st Head-liner's Night was held in 1950 and continues to recognize high school, college, and professional athletes, coaches and volunteers from local communities. In 1955 the first All-Peninsula football team was honored. In 1958, base-ball, basketball and track were added.

The Club became involved in community projects, advocating a "civic center" which became the Hampton Coliseum, and was involved in bringing professional baseball back to the Peninsula in 1963. Walter A. "Bud" Porter, Jr.

In nearly 50 years of service, Porter has been a constant contributor to the success of the Peninsula Sports Club.

Tonight's Master of Ceremonies has held every PSC office including two terms as President since he came aboard in 1967. He has served on the Board of Directors since 1969. A graduate of William and Mary and Hampton High School, Porter starred as a running back/punter in football at both institutions.

His athletic career included a 16-year stint as a catcher for the famed Fox Hill fast-pitch softball team. During that time he played in one World and four National Tournaments. He is a member of the ASA Tidewater Virginia Softball Hall of Fame.

As a coach, he served four years as a football assistant at The Apprentice School and many more in area youth football and softball programs.

Porter was a charter board member for the Peninsula Boys and Girls Club, and has served with that body for over three decades. In 2019, Bud was voted to their Wall of Fame.

He was the PSC's Man of the Year in 2000, a Charles Karmosky Award winner in 1993 and a Special Achievement honoree in 1970. Bud was made a PSC lifetime member in 2008.



Billy Haun

In July 2016, Dr. John W. "Billy" Haun became the Executive Director of the Virginia High School League (VHSL). Dr. Haun brings 36 years of education experience and leadership to the VHSL. He worked for 17 years in the Commonwealth of Virginia as a middle and high school teacher and coach in Pulaski, Wythe, Tazewell, Caroline and Albemarle County. In Albemarle County, Dr. Haun also served twelve years as an assistant principal, middle and high school principal and five years as the Assistant Superintendent for Student Learning before leaving to work at the State Department of Education. For almost two years, Dr. Haun served the Virginia Department of Education as Chief Academic Officer and Assistant Superintendent for Instruction.

Dr. Haun is married to India Haun, who is an administrator in Albemarle County and has two daughters, Brittany and Brooke who are both math teachers. He is also the proud grandparent of granddaughter, Carter and grandson, Camden.

Several Peninsula Sports Club awards are labeled, but not identified...

The **HERBERT MOREWITZ** Sports Person of the Year Award is presented in honor of the club's first president (1949) and an organization co-founder. He was tireless, generous and always optimistic. He spent untold hours coaching youngsters playing for his Hurricanes in the 1940s and 1950s, while also working with the Boys Scouts and Boys and Girls Club of the Virginia Peninsula for five decades until his death in 1997. His most successful venture was spearing a drive that raised \$1.2 million in 1985 for the construction of a Boys Club building in Denbigh. He also engineered raising \$235,000 to assist in the opening of Peninsula War Memorial Stadium in 1948. No one else backed Peninsula minor league baseball as fervently or tried as diligently to return it here after its collapse in 1992.

The **JULIE CONN** Outstanding High School Male Athlete of the Year Award remembers the colorful, extremely successful Newport News High School athletic director and coach of virtually all sports. He was unequaled in track, and basketball for decades. He spent 56 years in the Newport News school system before mandatory retirement at age 65 in 1970. His basketball teams never missed a VHSL state tournament from 1927 to 1953. His Typhoon won 396 games and lost 77. In track, his tutelage led to 21 outdoor state championships. He was the Peninsula Sports Club's first Man of the Year in 1951 and was National High School Track Coach of the Year in 1958.

The **HENRY JORDAN** Award goes to a professional athlete who demonstrates high integrity and a positive attitude. Jordan is most known for his stellar 11-year career with the NFL's Green Bay Packers (1959-69) as a defensive tackle. He graduated from Warwick High School in 1953 and played collegiately at Virginia. He was a seven-time All-Pro selection and played on the first two Super Bowl champion teams and five NFL champions. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame and the Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

The **CHARLES KARMOSKY** Award recognizes the community spirit which symbolized Karmosky's 38 years as sports editor of the Daily Press. The honor goes to a Peninsula Sports Club member for outstanding contributions to PSC activities. Karmosky was a founding member of the Club and its president in 1951. He was PSC Man of the Year in 1957, and was in the first class admitted to the media wing of Virginia State Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997.

THAD MADDEN spent 28 years as the football, basketball and track coach at Huntington High School in Newport News. In 1971, he moved to Warwick High School and stayed until his retirement in 1981. He owned a 251-114-16 career record in football. In a four-year stretch at Huntington, his basketball teams went 112-13 and won three Virginia Interscholastic League Eastern District titles. In track, his Vikings won 198 state individual titles.

The **BOB MOSKOWITZ** Media Award is presented to the area media person for exemplary presentation of area sports. Moskowitz, a Sports Club President in 1961, logged over 50 years in journalism, and is in the Media Wing of the Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

The **BETSY THOMAS** Outstanding High School Female Athlete of the Year Award is named for the long-time Lafayette High School athletic director, and James Blair High School field hockey and cheerleading coach. She was a pioneer in the advancement of girl's athletics in the state, and is co-founder of the Lafayette High School Hall of Fame. The 2016 Headliner's Event signifies the first year the Peninsula Sports Club named and presented this award in honor of Betsy Thomas.



Bryan Kersey

More than likely if you watched a college basketball game over the last 30 years, there is probably a fair chance that you have seen this person officiating the game.

Bryan Kersey, a longtime college basketball official will receive the highest honor bestowed upon an individual by the Peninsula Sports Club with the Herbert Morewitz Sportsperson of the Year award.

Born and raised in Newport News, Kersey has been involved in numerous area sports as a player, coach and most notably official. Be it on the softball fields, baseball diamonds or on the basketball courts, Kersey has been involved in area sports for most of his life.

He officiated Division I basketball for 30 years with 27 of those years in the Atlantic Coast Conference. During his career he also officiated in the Big East, Big 12, SEC, Atlantic 10, American, Colonial, MAAC, Big South and Conference USA.

His consistency helped put him into several post-season thrillers. He worked 22 ACC and NCAA Tournaments, seven ACC title games, four NCAA Regional Finals, three NCAA Regional Semifinals and was topped in 2015 as he worked the NCAA Men's Final Four in Indianapolis, Indiana.

He is now the Coordinator of Men's Basketball Officials for several NCAA Division I leagues including the ACC, CAA and the Atlantic 10.

In his spare time, for 18 years he ran the travel baseball organization Hampton Roads Hurricanes. He started when his son Shayne was young and continued it after his playing days were complete - Shayne went on to play second base at Christopher Newport University where he earned his bachelor's degree.

When Shayne had aged out of the travel baseball scene, Bryan went back and began coaching an 11-and-under team in the organization and coached them until they all completed their time through their high school years. This team during their time played in two national championship games and two national semi finals in their seven years together. All of these players are all from the local area playing in either the Bay Rivers District or the Peninsula District with one playing at Windsor High School.

Steve Hardisty helped start the Canes and at his departure, Benny Delgado became a key to the player's growth and development. The Canes had great coaches and at times had as many as 15 teams competing at age groups from nine-and-under to 18-and-under. They even had a couple of softball teams.

The difference in the Canes organization was the academic responsibilities that each player had to maintain to stay on these teams. If they were 15 they had to have a 2.5 GPA - 16 they had to have a 2.75 and at 17, they had to have a 3.0.

Most of his players went on to play college baseball and received academic scholarships to attend schools such as RIchmond, Longwood, VMI, Hamden Sydney, Randolph Macon, St Augustine and Va Wesleyan just to name a few. Kersey is most proud that his players went on to graduate college with high honors and became their own success stories.

The Canes had two rules - players never do anything to embarrass your parents and parents never do anything to embarrass you son.

He also helped coach Hampton Christian baseball for six years with the legendary Mike Moore.

Kersey, now residing in Carrollton, is the son of Eleanor and the late Jess Kersey who officiated in the NBA for 33 years. He has been married to his wife Cindy, the principal at Hampton Christian Academy, for the past 35 years and they have two children, Shayne and Krysten. Shayne, who is married to Jess, received his Master's Degree from ODU after graduation from Christopher Newport, while Kristen recently graduated from ODU and will finish her Master's Degree from ODU in August.

The 2019 Charles Karmosky Award winner has taken advantage of modern technology to do her work for the club, from many miles away. Menchville High School

Menchville High School takes the 2018-19 Rice Award after yet another strong season for the Monarch teams.

All fall teams qualified for regional competition keyed by the girls volleyball team who had the best record in the Peninsula District. The golf and field hockey teams had the second best records in district play and advanced to regionals. Field hockey also added the Player of the Year in Group 5A.

In the pool, the Menchville teams continued lengthy winning streaks against Peninsula District competition as the girls have been undefeated for five years running, while the boys have a three-year undefeated streak. Both basketball teams, both indoor track teams and the wrestling team joined the swimmers as regional qualifiers.

In the spring, softball shared the best record in the Peninsula District and advanced to states after winning Group 5A East. Baseball took second in the district and also advanced to states. Both soccer teams, boys tennis and boys outdoor track earned regional bids while the girls tennis team finished undefeated in the district.

Boys and Girls Basketball, Wrestling, Boys and Girls Indoor Track as well as the swim teams were all regional qualifiers.

Gene Duncan

No one will ever know just how great a young athlete Gene Duncan really was in the late 1930's. That's especially true tonight as we honor our newest Sports Person Emeritus.

Certainly his track feats boarded on the sublime. A clue can be gleaned from Newport News High School Head Track Coach Julie Conn, who told co-coach Charlie Nuttycombe about Duncan's possible abilities. "He's all yours; see what you can do with him". To be sure, Duncan would mature despite injury, as a great track and football athlete at Newport News High School in what proved to be the end of his competitive days.

Duncan first enjoyed competitive success at Stonewall Jackson Grade School, where he began what turned into his sprint career against a classmate, and he won the sprint by emerging triumphantly. He liked the idea that it was pretty quick. Duncan said "I learned to pace my stride with the sidewalk splits, I would run and never hit a crack and that's what got my stride right, I never missed a beat." As his first competition in the seventh grade. As a result of his combined outburst of strength, speed and fortitude, Duncan started shredding track records when still in the seventh grade and ran varsity track for three record breaking years.

In football, his task was made much easier when teamed with other brilliant Typhoon campaigners. Names like Donny White, Don Carroll, Frank Freeland, Ed Harris, Buddy Isbell, Kenny Womack, Allen Hall, Bill Roady (recalled by Duncan as the joker of the group), Phil Turner ("small in stature but built like steel"), ever versatile Horace Underwood and Downie Wray. He played on the Newport News team that defeated their arch-rival for the first time in 10 years.

Among one of his brilliant memories, is his 97-yard touchdown run at Princess Anne.

David Six



Hampton University women's basketball coach *David Six* had more than your normal share of challenges as his Lady Pirates prepared for their inaugural season of Big South Conference action. A stroke in late June put the long-standing coach into a new role, one of patient.

The work was shown throughout the year as not only did Six make it back to work in time to be on the floor in the season opener, he also won his 200th career game in late November as Hampton rallied to defeat James Madison.

In early April, Six was recognized by the United States Basketball Writers Association at the NCAA Women's Basketball Final Four as the 2019 Pat Summitt Most Courageous Award recipient.

As a result of that award in April and all the work leading up to that, Six will be presented the Thad Madden Award at the Peninsula Sports Club Headliners Night.

"For all Pat Summitt did on and off the court for women's basketball, to receive an award with her name attached is amazing," said Six.

Pat Summitt, the legendary Hall of Fame Tennessee women's coach, had the award named after her in 2012 when she received the award in the wake of her battle against Early-onset Alzheimer's being revealed the previous summer.

Summitt, the first women's coach to surpass 1,000 victories, ultimately succumbed to the disease in June of 2016.

Six now through his tenth season at the helm of the Lady Pirates, had a summer that consisted more of work in rehabilitation than recruiting. Driving his wife to an appointment at Johns Hopkins Hospital in late June, he felt some discomfort and heaviness in his right arm. Upon arriving for the appointment, he fell in the parking lot.

A doctor found him and got him inside where he eventually made his way to the emergency room. As he sat to have his vitals taken, he fell again. It was then determined that he was having a stroke.

As he told the Daily Press' Dave Johnson in a story about him after winning his 200th career game in late November, hitting that milestone was extra special. "Two hundred meant so much more because of all I've been through," Six said. "I don't want to say me — my family, my team, a lot of people. They've all been supportive from the very beginning, especially when you don't know 'can this guy still do this job?'

"Everything was greatly appreciated. Because you know now that could be taken away from you."

He attacked "Boot-camp" rehab with a vigor and was released into a rehab facility on July 4. At the end of the month he went to live with his daughter before coming back to the area a couple weeks later.

Six will enter the 2019-20 season, his 11th with the Lady Pirates, sporting a career record of 214-106.



Rona Altschuler

Rona Altschuler was born in Newport News on April 23, 1954 and except for living in Norfolk while going to ODU, where she received a bachelor's degree in dental hygiene, Newport News has been her home. She is the middle of three siblings, a sister(teacher)in Colorado and a brother(physician) in Maryland.

Altschuler has been married to Alan for 41 years and with one son, Gus, who is 27 and lives in Norfolk. After a 40-year career as a dental hygienist, she transitioned to currently working part time at Weymouth Funeral Home with friend and owner Veronica Weymouth.



In 1995 she got the volunteer bug helping with the American Cancer Society. From 1997-2002, she was volunteer chair of the ACS national event in our community called "Relay For Life". Having never been in the "leadership" role, she relied on the support of an amazing community we created an event that has impacted so many lives and "created a sense of community I will never forget".

In 2009, she also began volunteering with the Alzheimer's Association national event "Walk To End Alzheimer's" and is currently chairing the event.

These two experiences taught her so many things about herself and how our Peninsula community is blessed with caring, compassionate and giving people.

As a self processed, "quiet, shy tomboy" growing up, she loved to play outside whenever possible. Altschuler took tennis lessons at age seven and that became her sport, competing in tournaments and on her high school tennis team. She liked tennis, but didn't have the constant, competitiveness to enjoy beating her opponents.

It was in 1970 when as a 16-year-old, her tennis coach got them running around the track and that is where she fell in love with running. The simplicity of the sport in where the only competition was herself gave her a boost. In her view a mile was "a big deal" but that changed as her passion for the sport grew,

In 1978, on the suggestion of a dental patient, Altschuler ran her first race in the Virginia Beach Shamrock. That was the year she got married and the following year 1979 her husband said she should step into marathon. After a change in training, she went to register for the 1979 event and switched to the marathon. A look of concern from the volunteer didn't deter Altschuler and she finished the event that had nearly 100 entries.

From there she continued that leading off the track as well as her passion on the track having participated in over 25 marathons and many other shorter races.

Another change in her athletic career hit in 2008 when after knee surgery she developed an infection which prevented her from running events anymore. She moved from road racing, to road biking as she started biking in 2014. After finding a company that plans bike rides, she's done trips from San Diego

to St. Augustine, Fla. (3100 miles), along with riding the infamous Route 66 from Chicago to Santa Monica, Ca. (2500 miles)

She had two goals in that to see America, but raise funds for the Alzheimer's Association.

Through her running and riding time, one thing she has learned about herself – with the help of her father -- If you are not GRATEFUL you will never be happy.





Chad Pinder

Chadwick Hudson Pinder was originally signed by A's scout Neil Avent...graduated from Poquoson (VA) High School...attended Virginia Tech University and graduated in 2016...as a junior in 2013, was selected to the Blacksburg Regional All-Tournament Team, ACC All-Tournament Team, and All-ACC first team...also earned All-ACC Academic Team honors in 2011 and 2012.

2018 - Batted .258 with 13 home runs and 27 RBI in 110 games in a season interrupted by two stints on the disabled list...the average was his highest of his three seasons with Oakland as was his .332 on-base percentage and .769 OPS...became the first player in Oakland history


Jalani Davis

Ha'ani Smith


Ha'ani Smith is a recent graduate of Bruton High School where she ran track and field all four years as well as played volleyball.





Gabby Gillis

Gillis has been a groundbreaking student-athlete throughout her tenure at CNU. She is the first Christopher Newport University student-athlete in any sport to earn National Scholar Player of the Year recognition, collecting the honor after a decorated career with the Captains. Gillis graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology and Sociology and a minor in Leadership Studies. She earned a 3.72 cumulative GPA and graduated magna cum laude. In addition, she was a three-time Academic All-Conference selection.

She was named a United Soccer Coaches Scholar All-America First Team selection for the second straight year and was also recognized as a United Soccer Coaches first-team All-American becoming the first two-time All-American in program history. In addition, she was named the National Midfielder of the Year by D3soccer.com. She is the first women's student-athlete since Chelsie Schweers (Women's Basketball) in 2011 to earn top honors in her sport and just the fourth Captain, men's or women's, to collect the honor in the last 20 years (Kenny Moreland - 2008, Baseball; Richard Roethell - 2012, Track & Field).

This past year, the senior from Leesburg, Va. put forth the finest effort of her illustrious career, setting career-highs in every statistical category. She became just the third player in program history to score 40 points in a single season by finishing the year with 41 points on 15 goals and 11 assists. She wrapped her career ranked third in career points, with 96, and fourth in career goals scored, with 38. Gillis became the all-time leader in games played and started, as well as obliterating the previous record for consecutive games played and started in a career. She started all 85 games in her tenure as a Captain while helping CNU women's soccer raise the bar for team success. The Captains won a record 71 games over the last four years, going 71-11-3 for a monstrous winning percentage of 85.3%. Gillis helped the Captains advance to the final four of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history.

With this being the first year that Hampton University was a member of the Big South Conference, Pirates fans were curious as to who would be the first team to make their mark in the new league. You didn't have to take long to find out, and it came on the track.

Jerrick Powell, a key component to the men's indoor track and field team sweeping the Big South Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field Championships, is being recognized as the Hampton Athlete of the Year by the Peninsula Sports Club. The championships are the first for Hampton as members of the Big South Conference.

A native of St. Louis, Mo., Powell accounted for 34 points and finished in the top three in five different events for Hampton as they won the Big South title. He was a part of the winning 4x400 relay team, took seconds in the 200 and 400 meters and thirds in the high jump and long jump. Powell also added a fifth place finish in the triple jump and a seventh in the 60 hurdles to round out a weekend accounting for 44 points.

He has carried that momentum into the spring helping lead Hampton to a seventh place finish at the prestigious Colonial Relays with a first place in the 4x200 relay and a second in the 4x400.

The Pirates went to the Big South Conference Championships in early May with a target on them after winning the indoor title, and Powell earned three All-Conference awards helping lead the men to the team crown. He earned first team honors in the 400 meters and as a member of the 4x400 relay along with a third team honor in the 200 meters.










HAMPTON UNIVERSITY CONGRATULATES

He had a season best 5-for-5 performance in the Hampton Roads Cup with two doubles and three RBIs, while adding a pair of four hit games.


Carter is the son of Jeffrey and Lesia B. Carter and has three siblings, Justin and John Carter and Antoine Furlow.



A staple in the Tribe rotation, senior Bodie Sheehan concluded his career making 61 appearances and 58 starts. He pitched 351.1 innings, with a 4.02 ERA, with 237 strikeouts, and a .263 opposing batting average. The lefty concludes his Tribe career with 58 career starts, which is the most in program history. He also ranks second with 351.1 innings, seventh in strikeouts (237), ninth in fewest walks per nine innings (2.18), 10th in wins (17), and 10th in pickoffs (6).





Marcus Carter

Carter is a fifth-year senior from Williamsburg, and set the new CNU school record for career games played with 125.

He led the Captains in scoring (17.1 ppg) and rebounding (7.1 rpg) as CNU recorded a 29-4 record this year and a Final Four appearance. He ended his illustrious career with 1,834 points for an average of 14.7 ppg. Marcus concluded his career fourth on CNU's all-time scoring list.

Carter recorded a new career-high 31-point performance against York (Pa.) on February 23rd in the Capital Athletic Conference Championship game at the Freeman Center.

He was selected second team All-America this season by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) and was picked first team All-State by the Virginia Sports Information Directors (VaSID). He was previously first team All-American by the NABC following his 2015-16 sophomore season, and received statewide recognition three times during his career/

Carter was named first team All-Conference in the Capital Athletic Conference this season. He was also selected first team All-Region by D3hoops.com. Carter was honored as the CAC's Player of the Year in his 2015-16 sophomore season.

Carter led the Captains to the only two Final Fours in the 52-year history of CNU men's basketball.

Named the CAC's Rookie of the Year following freshman season in 2014-15 after averaging 12.7 points and 7.0 rebounds per contest.



Clara Wincheski

Clara Wincheski runs cross country and track at the University of North Carolina at Asheville. She graduated from Bruton High School in 2018, where she ran cross country and track from eighth grade through her senior year, and holds the school record in the 5k and the 3200.


Wincheski made the dean's list her freshman year at UNC Asheville, where she is studying psychology and special education, a field in which she became interested through her work at a summer camp for children with intellectual disabilities the past three summers, and an internship during her senior year of high school.

During the past cross country season, Clara was named the Big South Cross Country Women's Runner of the Week three times, and also earned the school's 5k and 6k freshman records, as well as the 6k school record.











Baron Freeman

Baron Freeman is already off to a historic start as a cross country runner at Saint Augustine's University. The Falcons' freshman achieved something no other runner has done at SAU, known for its storied cross country and track and field programs. The Hampton, Va., native was named NCAA Division II Men's Cross Country National Athlete of the Week in October 2018 by the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association, becoming the first Falcons' runner in school history to capture the prestigious award. Freeman earned the honor for winning the CIAA Men's Cross Country Title in his first season.


Freeman racked up several other honors as a freshman at Saint Augustine's University. He was selected CIAA Men's Cross Country Runner of the Year after the regular season, in which he compiled four CIAA Men's Runner of the Week honors and won the Monarch Classic in September 2018. By winning the CIAA conference crown, Freeman earned a trip to the NCAA Division II Atlantic Regional Cross Country Championships in Pittsburgh, Pa., which took place in November 2018.

In track and field, Freeman exceled in the 5,000-meter run, an event he won at the CIAA Indoor Championships in February 2019. He also placed third in the one-mile run and was part of the second-place distance medley relay team to claim medals in all three events. His performance helped the Falcons win their 22nd straight conference indoor title. During the outdoor season, Freeman was runner-up in the 5000 run as the Falcons won their 22nd consecutive CIAA crown as well.

The SAU freshman is also a winner in the classroom. A sociology major, Freeman has a 3.4 cumulative grade point average.

After an outstanding season, Freeman is poised to set more milestones at SAU in the coming years.







George Dudley President and Chief Executive Officer of BayPort Credit Union

Under his leadership, Dudley championed and supported long-term partnerships with numerous local community and charitable organizations including the Virginia Peninsula Foodbank, Relay for Life of Newport News-York-Poquoson, Southeastern Virginia Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association, and The Salvation Army of the Virginia Peninsula.

His passion for service to his community also led him to volunteer work and leadership roles, previously serving with the Boys & Girls Clubs of the Virginia Peninsula and the Boy Scouts of America. George was also a 20-year volunteer for various youth league baseball and softball teams, including York County Little League and the Virginia Legends Softball organization.

Earlier this year, he received the Virginia credit union system's highest individual honor – the James P. Kirsch Lifetime Achievement Award. The award, given by the Virginia Credit Union League, recognizes individuals who have selflessly devoted their time and energy to ensuring a brighter, better future for credit unions.
