

Since its founding in 1949, the Peninsula Sports Club has been an active force on the sports scene. The 1st Head-liner's Night was held in 1950 and continues to recognize high school, college, and professional athletes, coaches and volunteers from local communities. In 1955 the first All-Peninsula football team was honored. In 1958, base-ball, basketball and track were added.

The Club became involved in community projects, advocating a "civic center" which became the Hampton Coliseum, and was involved in bringing professional baseball back to the Peninsula in 1963. In 2012, we were proud to incorporate the PSC Foundation to enhance the Club and its offerings. The Club provides financial aid to high school athletes throughout the greater Peninsula area through the scholarship program and is active with many events throughout the Peninsula through our membership.

The goals of the Club have remained the same over the years, to identify and recognize Peninsula citizens who promote sport activities make outstanding contributions to perpetuate community athletics; and to recognize outstanding Peninsula athletes, many of whom have gained national acclaim. Jay Colley

One of the nation's longest- tenured college sports broadcasters, Colley has been a fixture of the Tribe's sports broadcasts for 40 years. During that impressive tenure, he has missed just three W&M football games, which was due to illness during the Tribe's 2010 playoff run.

Colley calls the play-by-play for the Tribe in football, basketball and select baseball game. Colley is also a veteran baseball commentator, who was previously the voice of the Rochester Redwings, the Richmond Braves, the Tidewater Tides and the Norfolk Tides. In recognition of Colley's years of service to the College, he was selected as an honorary alumnus of William & Mary and was officially presented with the honor at Charter Day in February, 2003.

Colley was a mass communications graduate of Middle Tennessee State University. In 2012, he received the W&M men's basketball program's Sixth Man Award for his hard work and dedication to the program. Jay and his wife Cindy have a daughter, Carleigh Danielle, who graduated from James Madison University, and a son, Benjamin William, who was an All-American swimmer at North Carolina.



Jason Bryant

For the last 28 years, broadcasting, announcing and writing has been a constant presence in Jason Bryant's life. Originally from Newport News, Bryant moved to Poquoson in 1992 and it was there where the passion for broadcasting and announcing became a common practice. In the late 1990s, it was impossible to go to a Poquoson sporting event and not see Bryant covering the event or calling the action over the PA system.

A 1997 graduate of Poquoson High School and a 2004 graduate of Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Bryant's

Peninsula sports roots began with the Peninsula Poseidons, a popular semipro football team, in 1992. Two years later, as a freshman in high school, then-baseball coach George Yeager gave Bryant a shot on the mic. It was Poquoson's signature sport – wrestling – that helped take his career from Bull Island to the Olympics and help him become one of the most recognizable voices in the sport as both a broadcaster, journalist and PA announcer.

In 2021, Bryant received the Bob Moskowitz Media Award literally the day after he arrived from Tokyo, Japan, where he worked his third Olympic Games and his second as the public address voice of wrestling.

From 1997-2004, Bryant worked at the Daily Press. He created Mat Talk Online, a Virginia-based wrestling website in October of 1997 out of his dorm room. The website and wrestling coverage led to numerous announcing gigs around the region, state and eventually, the world. Bryant left Virginia in 2005 and since has worked for the National Wrestling Coaches Association, USA Wrestling and Amateur Wrestling News before rebranding and relaunching Mat Talk Online as his own business into the world's largest on-demand wrestling audio website.

He's produced, edited and distributed over 3,000 podcast episodes. Bryant has either covered or announced 24 Virginia Duals, 48 different college national championships (and counting), 16 World Championships, 17 World or Olympic Team Trials and three Olympic Games. The first time Bryant ever stepped foot on an airplane was to cover the Junior Nationals in Fargo, North Dakota in 1999. He hasn't missed one since. Wrestling's help take him to 43 states and 27 countries on six continents. Sadly, there doesn't seem to be any wrestling in Antarctica.

Few in the sport's history are as accomplished in a media and broadcasting role as Bryant. In May of 2022, he was named Wrestling Insider Newsmagazine's Journalist of the Year for the second time, giving him his 16th major award in the last 21 years. Bryant is the President of the National Wrestling Media Association, a post he's held since 2009. He's currently a resident of New Brighton, Minnesota with his wife Abby and two gold medal daughters – Lucy London (10) and Ruby Rio (5).

The **HERBERT MOREWITZ** Sports Person of the Year Award is presented in honor of the club's first president (1949) and an organization co-founder. He was tireless, generous and always optimistic. He spent untold hours coaching youngsters playing for his Hurricanes in the 1940s and 1950s, while also working with the Boys Scouts and Boys and Girls Club of the Virginia Peninsula for five decades until his death in 1997. His most successful venture was spearing a drive that raised \$1.2 million in 1985 for the construction of a Boys Club building in Denbigh. He also engineered raising \$235,000 to assist in the opening of Peninsula War Memorial Stadium in 1948. No one else backed Peninsula minor league baseball as fervently or tried as diligently to return it here after its collapse in 1992.

The **JULIE CONN** Outstanding High School Male Athlete of the Year Award remembers the colorful, extremely successful Newport News High School athletic director and coach of virtually all sports. He was unequaled in track, and basketball for decades. He spent 56 years in the Newport News school system before mandatory retirement at age 65 in 1970. His basketball teams never missed a VHSL state tournament from 1927 to 1953. His Typhoon won 396 games and lost 77. In track, his tutelage led to 21 outdoor state championships. He was the Peninsula Sports Club's first Man of the Year in 1951 and was National High School Track Coach of the Year in 1958.

The **HENRY JORDAN** Award goes to a professional athlete who demonstrates high integrity and a positive attitude. Jordan is most known for his stellar 11-year career with the NFL's Green Bay Packers (1959-69) as a defensive tackle. He graduated from Warwick High School in 1953 and played collegiately at Virginia. He was a seven-time All-Pro selection and played on the first two Super Bowl champion teams and five NFL champions. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame and the Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

The **CHARLES KARMOSKY** Award recognizes the community spirit which symbolized Karmosky's 38 years as sports editor of the Daily Press. The honor goes to a Peninsula Sports Club member for outstanding contributions to PSC activities. Karmosky was a founding member of the Club and its president in 1951. He was PSC Man of the Year in 1957, and was in the first class admitted to the media wing of Virginia State Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997.

THAD MADDEN spent 28 years as the football, basketball and track coach at Huntington High School in Newport News. In 1971, he moved to Warwick High School and stayed until his retirement in 1981. He owned a 251-114-16 career record in football. In a four-year stretch at Huntington, his basketball teams went 112-13 and won three Virginia Interscholastic League Eastern District titles. In track, his Vikings won 198 state individual titles.

The **BOB MOSKOWITZ** Media Award is presented to the area media person for exemplary presentation of area sports. Moskowitz, a Sports Club President in 1961, logged over 50 years in journalism, and is in the Media Wing of the Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

The **BETSY THOMAS** Outstanding High School Female Athlete of the Year Award is named for the long-time Lafayette High School athletic director, and James Blair High School field hockey and cheerleading coach. She was a pioneer in the advancement of girl's athletics in the state, and is co-founder of the Lafayette High School Hall of Fame. The 2016 Headliner's Event signifies the first year the Peninsula Sports Club named and presented this award in honor of Betsy Thomas.

Maurice Pierce



Maurice Pierce, finishing his 23rd year at Hampton University and 20th as head coach, has enjoyed a career that has seen him travel around the world coaching world class track and field athletes and leading the track programs at Hampton.

In a career that has seen many honors for Pierce, he earns another honor being named the 2022 Peninsula Sports Club Herbert Morewitz Sportsperson Of The Year.

Upon learning of the award, Pierce was caught by surprise. "I was in shock when I heard that I would be receiving the 2022 Peninsula Sports Club Sports Person of the Year Award," he said. "It is truly an honor to be recognized for all of my hard work and successes at Hampton University. Having my name mentioned with

past greats such as Francena McCorory among other local coaches and standouts is very humbling.

Pierce, a Newport News native and graduate of Norfolk State, has been involved with the Hampton track program since 1999 and took over as the Director of Cross Country and Track and Field in 2012.

Among his many highlights in that time frame he has coached seven Olympians, four Olympic medalists, six World Championship participants with three medalists and four Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Hall of Fame Inductees. The sport of track and field has given him chances to visit places such as London, Tokyo, Bejing, China, Africa, Russia, Norway and many other places around the world.

In his Hampton University career, he has guided his teams to 33 championships which are the most since the Pirates made the move to NCAA Division I. Only Dr. Robert Screen has won more championships at Hampton with 37 tennis crowns when the Pirates were NCAA Division II.

The Pirates are in the midst of moving to the Colonial Athletic Assocation, starting July 1, and look to make an immediate impact. In their first season of Big South Conference competition, the track programs made a statement as both teams swept the track titles winning indoor and outdoor crowns. Pierce was selected as the Coach of the Year for both indoor teams and the women's outdoor for the second double sweep for Hampton in school history.

He also covers William and Mary, Hampton University and Christopher Newport University athletics and reports on Langley Speedway in Hampton.

In his spare time, he looks at a lot of college sports and he's a lover of Kentucky basketball.

Marty is an advocate for the youth of his community. O'Brien said he wants to concentrate on building a thriving community by first focusing on the city's youth.

In 2021, the Virginian-Pilot, Daily Press, Virginia Gazette and Tidewater Review won 63 awards in this year's Virginia Press Association news and advertising contest. The four Virginia Media publications won 19 first-place awards. Marty O'Brien won three (3) first place awards with his expert journalism.

Ray Smith

A longtime resident of the Virginia Peninsula, Ray Smith grew up in Newport News where he was a three sport athlete, lettering in football, baseball, and basketball at Warwick High School. After graduating from Warwick in 1967, Ray earned a football scholarship to Frederick College and started as a freshman. Emory and Henry College picked up his scholarship after Frederick disbanded, and he continued his collegiate football career as a three-year starter at defensive back.

After graduation from Emory and Henry, Ray was hired by Hampton City Schools and taught U. S. History at Kecoughtan High School from 1971-1975 where he was also the Assistant Varsity Football Coach and JV Baseball Head Coach. Ray was on the first faculty of Phoebus High School in 1975, and he was the school's first varsity baseball coach.

After spending the better part of the 1970's in public education and coaching, Ray left Hampton City Schools to become a co-owner and manager of the Ski Center's Hampton location from 1978-1984. He was hired as the City of Hampton's Tennis Director and ran the Hampton Tennis Center from 1980-1990. He was the Sports Director and Head Tennis Pro at Kiln Creek Golf and Country Club from 1990-1992.

Ray returned to Hampton City Schools in 1993, teaching U. S. History from 1993-2014. He replaced Dennis Kozlowski as Director of Athletics at Bethel High School in 1998 and served in that capacity until his retirement in June of 2015. His return to public education coincided with a return to coaching. He was Bethel's girls' varsity tennis coach from 1993-1997. Ray coached the varsity girls at Hampton Roads Academy from 1992-2012. His HRA teams were highly successful, achieving 22 consecutive winning seasons including two undefeated seasons, four conference championships, three state championships, and over 200 victories. He was selected as Coach of the Year in the Tidewater Conference of Independent Schools six times.

While the AD at Bethel, Ray joined the Peninsula Sports Club because he wanted to support the mission of the club, especially as it pertains to the recognition of outstanding high school athletes. Of special interest is increasing the revenue of the Peninsula Sports Club Foundation with the goal of increasing the number of scholarships that the PSC gives to graduating seniors.

Ray has been married to his college sweetheart, Linda, for 50 years. He is a dedicated father to his son Justin and daughter-in-law Tammy and an equally doting grandfather to Madeline. Ray is a longtime member of First Presbyterian Church in Hampton, where he has served as Deacon. In his retirement, he continues to be involved in local high school sports, serving as director of various track and tennis championships at the regional and state levels for the Virginia High School League.





Jim Guthrie

James W. Guthrie was the fore-runner to Leroy Keyes at Carver High School. They lived in the same neighborhood and Leroy Keyes learned a lot by watching James Guthrie play.

Guthrie was an outstanding, multi-talented athlete at Carver High School, Newport News, VA from 1959 – 1963. He played football, basketball and ran track for 4 years.

James played point guard on the basketball team and average double figures for three (3) years. He was the leader of the was chosen captain of the team, his junior and senior years.

In 1961 and 1962, James Guthrie won the Long Jump at the VIA State Championship. He set the state record, 1962, with a jump of 23feet, 10 3/4 inches. He was undefeated for two years in the long jump.

He was also the VIA State Champion in the 100-yard dash and Champion in the 220-yard dash.

He played football for three (3) years. He was the 1st team running back and played 1st team safety, on the defensive side of the ball.

In 1961, Carver won the VIA Football Championship. He co-captain of the team and played a vital role during that season. This is the only Championship, Carver has ever won.

He was voted as one of the 100 Top Athletes in the History of the Virginia Peninsula.

He was given honorable mention of the All-American Team in the Pittsburg Courier Publication.

He received a football scholarship to Hampton Institute. In 1962 and 1963, he was the leading rusher for Hampton Institute.

In 1963, James won the CIAA rushing championship over Leroy Kelly; Morgan State and Emerson Booser, Maryland Eastern Shore.

In the 1963, in the post season Fish Bowl, played in Norfolk, VA. Guthrie rushed for 220 yards. He had a n outstanding game to cap off an outstanding season.

Frank Conway "Conky" Sorrell



Lifelong Hampton Resident & Sports Enthusiast

The Early Years 1929-1947

I have been fascinated with sports for as long as I can remember. My Dad was a big baseball fan and carried me to ball games all over the area. Somehow, he came up with an old lefthanded 1st baseman mitt. That mitt went with me everywhere, hanging on my belt. Most of my original ball playing was right in the neighborhood and at school yards. I remember going to Hampton High School football games in 1936 (State Champions) and seeing Corky Davis and Nelson Catlett play.

My Dad and older brother, Gilly, beat me to death teaching me how to catch the ball, throw the ball and hit. I became a New York Yankee fan for

life and read every article I could get my hands on about them.

The first organized team I ever played on was with the Wythe Christian Boys Club. They were sponsored by Wythe Parkway Baptist Church and was a softball team. We played against other church boy teams. At that time there were not any city or county programs or sponsored leagues.

A man in Wythe got together a football team to play in the Newport News Leagues. There was a 120# weight limit and practices were about two miles from where I lived on Shell Road. By this time, I was in Junior High at George Wythe. I played baseball and football for them but since there were no Junior High's around, we played High Schools. So called "B" Varsity Teams, or men's teams. We held our own pretty darn good.

It was about this time someone in Wythe organized and entered a baseball team in the Newport News City League for kids about 13-14. I made the All-Star Team and got to play the champion "East End Blue Devils" in a three-game series under the lights. This was my first time playing under lights. We played at the old "Baby Dodgers" ballpark on Virginia Avenue. This was also the first time I ever wore a team uniform.

The Apprentice School, Hampton Royal & Shipyard League Years 1947-1967

I graduated from Hampton High in June of 1947. I went into the Shipyard Apprentice School in August. I played basketball in the Apprentice House League and Varsity baseball for four years. While in the "A" school I got to play for Seaford in the recently established Semi-Pro Tri County League. Around this time the manager of the Hampton Royals noticed a Hampton boy playing in York County and he expected me to play for him! It was 1950 and I was with the Royals for ten years. The last five years as playing Manager. During this time, we were runner up in two state semi- pro tournaments and won it once in 1958. This win entitled us to go to the National tournament in Wichita, Kansas. The Royals came out tied for 7th place. After the Tri-County League folded the Royals played in the Semi-Pro Tidewater League from 1957-1959.

During this time, I also played basketball in the Shipyard League for many years and played Shipyard League baseball from 1949-1967.

The Golf Years 1961-Present

My kids grew up around ball parks and still talk about it. I coached Pony League baseball 1967-1968 and Colt League 1969-1971. I continued to umpire boys' baseball until they started paying the umpires.

As my baseball playing days were slowing down, I started playing golf. I joined the Hampton Golf Association in 1961 around the time my youngest was born. I was on the Board of Directors and served as Golf Chairman for 25 years. I played in numerous tournaments (i.e., PEN AM, Hampton AM, Hampton Senior AM, VSGA Mid-Championship, State Team matches and others).

I joined the Hampton Golf Association (HGA) and represented them at many VSGA meetings and events. Over the years I have had eight hole in ones. When I turned 80 years of age, I was voted to be a lifetime honorary member of the HGA. The one thing I will never forget is making a six-foot par putt on the 18th hole to break 80 on my 90th birthday...shot a 79. I joined the Hampton Senior Golf Association in 1991 and served as President for about 20 years.



Brandon Sipe

A major part of Hampton Roads' golf future recently became the present, and it has been displayed on the Golf Channel.

Yorktown's Brandon Sipe made the most of a trip to southwestern Louisiana, winning the boys 13-and-under title at the Notah Begay III All Boys Jr. Golf National Championship from Nov. 13-15, 2021. While the youngest player in a field of 30, he shot a 16-under-par 200 for three rounds on the nearly 6,000-yard course, Koasati Pines at Coushatta, to win by five strokes. Highlights were shown on a Golf Channel program and are on YouTube now.

"It was amazing," said Sipe in an article in the Daily Press after the event who is a homeschooled seventh grader that has never taken a formal golf lesson. "I'd never played that good before. I did shoot, like, 66s, but (never) that consistent, in a big tournament with all that pressure, with all those cameras."

Juniorgolfscoreboard.com lists Sipe as the fourth-best player nationally in the 12th-grade class of 2027.

Sipe, a natural left-hander who's a right-handed golfer, first raised a few eyebrows in the area when he was about 5. He would blast tennis balls well enough to impress the players on a Peninsula District champion boys team coached by his dad, Steve, a science teacher at Menchville High in Newport News.

Practicing with his father, Sipe — who started at age 2 — already was using a regular-size racket and tennis balls. But many tournaments in his age group were contested with smaller rackets and foam balls, which frustrated him.

"But then there was a golf event at my golf course, Kiln Creek, and I did it," he said. "Then I did a camp and I enjoyed it. At first I was just playing for fun, and then I wanted to do good. I started playing tournaments at 8 1/2 and took it serious when I turned 9.

"I started shooting under par when I was 10. My average score was 35 or 34 in nine-hole tournaments."

Steve Sipe, who occasionally caddies for his son, estimated that Brandon has won 98 of the 129 tournaments he has played, including a men's open at Kiln Creek at age 12. He turned 13 on Oct. 20.

Jamie Gunderson

Jamie Gunderson was appointed the head coach of the Christopher Newport women's soccer program in the spring of 2020 after serving as an assistant coach for eight years. He became the seventh Head Coach in the program's 24-year history.

In his second trip to the NCAA Division III National Semifinals, first as head coach, he guided the Captains to the first NCAA team championship outside of track and field in school history as CNU defeated top-ranked The College of New Jersey 2-0 in Greensboro, N.C. on December 4, 2021.



Gunderson, who has been with the Captains since the fall of 2012, previously served as an assistant coach under Dan Weiler for seven seasons before stepping into the interim head coaching position following the 2019 season. The interim tag was then removed in April.

Prior to taking the reins as the top assistant coach in 2014, Gunderson also served under head coach Ruth Keegan as a volunteer assistant coach in 2012 and started his tenure with Weiler in 2013. He has been a staple on the sidelines during the most successful stretch in program history as he helped guide the Captains to six straight regular season conference titles between 2013-18 and six NCAA Tournament berths in his time under coach Weiler. In a three-year stretch between 2016-18, the Captains set and re-set the program record for wins in a season while capturing the program's first three Capital Athletic Conference Tournament Championships.

In 2018, Gunderson was part of the coaching staff that led Christopher Newport to the NCAA Division III National Semifinals and wrapped up the season with a 21-2-0 overall record. For his efforts, he was honored as part of the United Soccer Coaches Atlantic South Region Coaching Staff of the Year.

Prior to arriving at Christopher Newport University, Gunderson was a four-year starter at Methodist University and was a USA South All-Sportsmanship Team representative for the Monarchs. He has competed professionally as a member of the Norfolk Sharx in the Major Indoor Soccer League and also played with the Lionsbridge FC. He also continued to hone his coaching prowess as a head coach with the VA Legacy soccer club in Williamsburg, Va. from 2009-19.

Christopher Newport women's soccer posted a 16-3-3 overall record and went 8-1-1 in conference play during the 2019 season. The Captains earned an at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament and reached the second round of the postseason tournament after a 2-0 win over Worcester State in the opening round.

Gunderson holds a "C" License from the United States Soccer Federation, earning the certificate in 2018.





Keith Parr

Christopher Newport University Head Coach 19 seasons....635-188-1 (.771)

Keith Parr has led the Christopher Newport softball program since 2003, and has overseen an amazing era in the program's history. The Captains have developed into one of the elite softball programs in all of Division III with Parr at the helm, and Christopher Newport won its first NCAA National Championship in 2022.

The Captains have now advanced to 15 consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, and Parr recorded his 600th career victory during the 2022 season. CNU captured the Coast-To-Coast Athletic Conference crown to advance to the tourney, and Parr was selected the Coach of the Year in the C2C.

Parr's Captains were ranked the top team in the nation for the last nine rankings of the season by the NFCA. 2022 marked Parr's his third trip to the finals, and the first since 2011 when Christopher Newport finished as the national runner-up.

The 2021 CNU squad received an at large bid to the tourney, falling in Texas in regional play to end the year at 28-14. Parr's Captains were 12-1 in 2020 prior to the cancellation of the remainder of the season due to CoVID. Christopher Newport was ranked third in the nation by the National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) when the season was halted.

CNU gained its first-ever #1 ranking during the 2019 season, as the Captains were picked as the top team in the nation in back-to-back weeks by the NFCA. Christopher Newport recorded a record of 37-9 and advanced to the Super Regional Round of the NCAA Tournament, ending the year as the 15th-ranked squad in the country.


Through 19 seasons as CNU's head coach, Parr has posted an overall record of 635-188-1 for a winning percentage of .771, which ranked eighth among active coaches at the Division III level...and 29th in the history of collegiate softball. His squads have also won at least a share of 13 regular season conference crowns and six tournament titles.

Parr graduated in 1999 from Christopher Newport with a degree in Recreation, Sports, and Wellness Management. He assisted former head coach Paul Weiss for four years from 2000-03, a span that saw the Captains go 131-38-2 for a winning percentage of .772, at the time the most successful four-year stretch in CNU softball history.











Ben Jones

The Apprentice School Builders, under first-year head coach Ben Jones, completed a run for the record books on May 19 winning three games in one day to capture the 2022 United States Collegiate Athletic Association (USCAA) Small College World Series Baseball Championship at Showers Field.


The fifth-seeded Builders captured the third title in school history with a wild 23-17 win over fourth-seeded Miami-Hamilton. Apprentice School rallied from a 15-2 deficit in the fifth and a 17-6 deficit in the sixth to score the wild victory. Apprentice School lost its opener to Miami-Hamilton and became the first team to lose its opener and work all the way through the elimination bracket to win the title in the history of the Small College World Series.

A combined 40 runs in the championship game broke the tournament record held since 2015, ironically when the last time Apprentice School won the championship defeating Illinois Tech 25-10.

Apprentice School started the tournament losing 12-2 to Miami-Hamilton before beginning its march through the elimination bracket with a pair of five-inning wins over Mid-Atlantic Christian (11-1) and Bryant & Stratton Albany (13-3). On Wednesday, the Builders defeated Penn State Mont Alto 7-1 and then eliminated the three-time defending champions Penn State DuBois 7-0. That set up the championship day that started with an eight-inning 6-3 win over Cinconnati-Clermont before they faced Miami-Hamilton again and won 14-3.

This is the third national title in Apprentice School baseball history winning in 2007 and 2015.





Riley Cook

Riley Cook finished her Christopher Newport career as the program's all-time leading scorer with 198 points on 90 career goals and 18 assists. She consistently ranked in the top-five nationally in points throughout her four seasons and finished her senior campaign with 53 points on 24 goals and five assists. She became the only player in DIII NCAA Tournament history to record a goal in all six games of the postseason event; she also became the first soccer player, men's or women's, to score five or more game-winning goals in the history of the NCAA Championship.

Cook set and re-set nearly every standard in the record book by every measure. She is the all-time leader in goals and points scored in a game, single season and career at Christopher Newport.

Cook was named the 2021 United Soccer Coaches Division III National Player of the Year and the D3soccer.com National Midfielder of the Year after leading her team to its first NCAA National Championship title in 2021 and recognized as the Tournament's Most Outstanding Player. The three-time Conference Player of the Year earned first team All-America plaudits for the third time and is a four-time first team All-Conference selection.

She was selected as the DIII Honda Athlete of the Year finalist for soccer as announced by THE Collegiate Women Sports Awards presented by Honda







Kaitlyn Hasty

Kaitlyn Hasty concluded her amazing softball career at Christopher Newport University by leading the Captains to the National Championship, and was named the National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) Schutt Sports Division III National Player of the Year.

"Kaitlyn has been one of the most-feared hitters in the country since she joined our program four years ago," Parr said. "She has continued to grow and develop due to her incredible work ethic, desire, and yearning to be the



absolute best. Her accomplishments, essentially in just over three seasons due to our shortened 2020 season, will be remembered and celebrated for years to come. We are so happy for her to receive post-season honors, especially knowing they come after the greatest team accomplishment ever, the National Championship."

Hasty, from Chesapeake, became the first CNU National Player of the Year after becoming the first three-time All-American in CNU softball history. She has been instrumental in the success of the program since her arrival in 2019, when she was named the National Freshman of the Year.

The power-hitting anchor in the third spot of the order helped lead the Captains to a 47-1 record, and along the way led the nation in home runs with 19 and set a new program career mark with 53 long balls. Her final career round-tripper came in the NCAA Fijnals, the go-ahead grand slam in the fifth inning of the opening game of a best-of-three championship series against Trine. The monster shot over the left field fence broke a 2-2 tie and propelled Christopher Newport to a 6-3 victory over the Thunder. It was Hasty's first long ball since her blast in a victory over fourth-ranked Salisbury in the Coast-to-Coast Athletic Conference Tournament at Captains Park.

For the season, Hasty batted .414 with 33 runs, 53 hits and 12 doubles, and led the country with 19 homers and 67 RBI. She ranked second nationally in slugging percentage (.953), had a .532 on-base percentage and a 1.485 OPS, drawing 28 walks and striking out just 16 times in 128 at-bats.

Uniform number 27, worn by Hasty since her arrival in the program, will never be issued again. A formal ceremony to retire the number will be held at a home game at Captains Park sometime during the 2023 season.

The Western Branch High School product earned Louisville Slugger/NFCA Division III Player of the Week honors, when she hit .700 with two doubles, three walks, four homers and 11 RBI. She previously earned All-Region and All-America honors in 2019 and 2021.

Christopher Newport was the top-ranked team in the nation for the final nine weeks of rankings. The Captains won their first 23 games before falling at Averett University in the second game of a doubleheader on March 27th. CNU responded after the loss, setting a new school record for consecutive wins by claiming their final 24 games, including ten in the NCAA tourney, to capture the National crown.

Hasty led a group of seven seniors in the CNU lineup, including two fifth-year seniors, that advanced to the NCAA Tournament each season of their careers. The Captains have now played in the last 15 NCAA Tournaments, and 19 in program history.



Troy Williams

Troy Williams, one who has won many awards throughout his career, earns another one this evening – the Henry Jordan Award from the Peninsula Sports Club.

Williams played three years at Phoebus High School before finishing his high school career at Oak Hill Academy. As a senior he averaged 16.2 points, 7.5 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 2.0 blocks with nine double-doubles. He was Gatorade Player of the Year as a senior as Oak Hill advanced to the National High School Invitational.



A three-year stint at Indiana, saw him earn third-team All-Big Ten honors as a junior averaging 13.3 points and 5.8 rebounds per game. He went into the 2016 NBA draft and joined the Phoenix Suns Summer League team. Williams shined and was picked up by the Memphis Grizzlies and secured an opening night roster spot. He has seen action with the Grizzlies, Houston Rockets, New York Knicks, Sacramento Kings and New Orleans Pelicans. In the G League/D League, Williams has seen time with the lowa Energy, Rio Grande Valley Vipers and Stockton Kings.

Williams scored an NBA career high 21 points for Houston in a win over Phoenix in 2017.

Troy Williams has provided an annual free basketball camp for the youth of the Peninsula over the last few years. He gives back to the community because the community gave a lot to him. Williams also takes time to work players on all levels of the Boo Williams Program, doing as older players did for him – Pay It Forward.





Caroline Bauer

Caroline Bauer is a senior student-athlete at Jamestown High School, having competed this year on the Cross-Country and Track and Field teams. She maintains a 4.1 GPA and graduated in the top 15 percent of her class. She is a member of the National Honor Society, National English Honor Society and the National Latin Honor Society.

In addition to her success in the classroom, Caroline is an accomplished distance runner. Her current PRs are 16:54 for Cross-Country (5k), 10:24 for the 3200m, 9:41 for the 3000m, 4:53 for the 1600m, 4:40 for the 1500m and 2:19 for the 800m. She holds the Jamestown High School records in all of those events, along with the VHSL Class 4 State Indoor Championship meet record in the 3200m. In 2022, Carolina was the Region 4A champion in Cross-Country, the Indoor Track 200m, 1600m and 4x800m relay champ, along with the Outdoor Track 3200m and 4x800m relay champion. She finished as the 2021 VHSL state runner up in Cross Country, the 2022 state champion in the Indoor Track 3200m and 2022 state runnerup in the Outdoor Track 3200m. In addition, Caroline earned High School All-American honors in Cross Country at the 2021 Garmin Running Lane Cross Country Championships and in Indoor Track at the 202 New Balance Indoor Nationals. She also placed fifth in the 3000m at the historic and iconic Penn Relays in April.

Caroline is active in the community, working with children and volunteering in the Sunday School program at the Williamsburg Community Chapel (WCC). She participates in the Student Ministries program at WCC and assists the leaders where needed. 






Olivia DiNonno

I could feel my heart pounding heavily throughout my entire body as I urged myself forward. My legs felt heavy and clumsy, my arms felt sore and limp; and yet I had never felt better. A certain calmness swept over me as I moved myself forward. I certainly didn't look calm. I looked like a sweaty, uncomfortable mess. But inside I was content as endorphins were released inside my mind, as well as any stressors from earlier in the day. I know it's highly controversial to say this, but I love running.

If there's anything long, tiring runs and short, painful sprints during cross country and track practice have taught me, it's willpower. This is a concept that I've come to value in other aspects of my life as well, whether it be completing schoolwork, helping my sister with chores, or staying on task at my job. The desire for something greater long term overcomes my immediate desire to quit. Although when I first joined track, I was one of the slowest people on the team (out of about 60 people). Fortunately, I received constant support from my coach and friends who encouraged me to work my hardest at each practice and to run on my own when I could. Even though it requires a lot of endurance every day, I love the sport and plan to do it in college.







High School

Cave attended Hampton Christian High School in Hampton, VA. As a pitcher for his high school's baseball team in his sophomore year, Cave had a 10–0 win-loss record and a 1.23 ERA with 109 strikeouts in 61 innings. He also demonstrated his hitting ability winning the World Wooden Bat Association Under-16 national title. He committed to attend Louisiana State University (LSU) on a college baseball scholarship. Before his junior year, he transferred to Kecoughtan High School. He also played basketball in high school. In 2011, his senior year at Kecoughtan, he had a .609 batting average. Cave was named the Peninsula District and Daily Press Player of the Year. He spent the summer after graduating from Kecoughtan playing for the Peninsula Pilots of the Coastal Plain League.

New York Yankees

The New York Yankees selected Cave in the sixth round, with the 209th overall selection, of the 2011 MLB draft. He signed with the Yankees, receiving a \$825,000 signing bonus. He made his professional debut that season for the Gulf Coast Yankees. In his first game, he fractured his kneecap in a collision at home plate. The injury caused him to miss the rest of the season as well as the entire 2012 season.

In 2013, Cave played 113 games for the Charleston RiverDogs of the Class A South Atlantic League. He finished the year hitting .282/.347/.401 with two home runs and 31 RBIs. Cave started the 2014 season with the Tampa Yankees of the Class A Advanced Florida State League. After hitting .304/.354/.395 with three home runs and 24 RBIs in 90 games with Tampa, he was promoted to the Trenton Thunder of the Class Double A Eastern League in July, where he finished the season batting .273 with four home runs and 18 RBIs in 42 games.

Cave spent 2015 with both Trenton and the Scranton/Wilkes-Barre RailRiders of the Class AAA International League, compiling a combined .278 batting average with two home runs and 39 RBIs. He was selected by the Cincinnati Reds in the 2015 Rule 5 draft. Cave did not make the Reds' Opening Day roster, and he was returned to the Yankees on April 5, 2016. In 2016, he played for Trenton and Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, posting a combined .268 batting average with eight home runs and 55 RBIs, and in 2017, he returned to both the Thunder and RailRiders, batting a combined .305 with 20 home runs and 56 RBIs.

The Yankees added Cave to their 40-man roster after the 2017 season He was designated for assignment on March 12, 2018, following the Yankees signing of Neil Walker.

Minnesota Twins

The Minnesota Twins acquired Cave on March 16, 2018, for minor league pitcher Luis Gil. He began the season with the Rochester Red Wings of the International League, and made his MLB debut on May 19. He hit his first major league home run in his first major league game. During the 2018 season, Cave hit 13 home runs and led all Major League Baseball hitters in average distance per home run, at 421 feet.

On May 13, 2019, Cave was sent down to the minor leagues. On the season, Cave hit .258 with 8 home runs and 25 RBI. He was added to the playoff roster for the 2019 postseason. In 2020, Cave hit .221 with 4 home runs and 15 RBI.

On May 15, 2021, Cave was placed on the 60-day injured list after suffering a fracture in his back. Cave was activated off of the injured list on July 24. On November 25, 2021, the Minnesota Twins outrighted Cave to the St. Paul Saints.

Personal Life

Cave's father, Bryan, played baseball at Kecoughtan and was the long-time head baseball coach of The Apprentice School. Both of Cave's sisters played softball on the Peninsula and were named All-District.

She taught on both the intermediate, and high school levels which allowed her to witness students develop as athletes and mature as individuals. As head track coach at Warwick High School, Coach Delaney provided leadership, mentorship and inspiration to future nuclear engineers, NFL players, Olympic gold-medal coaches, and neurosurgeons. Her moto was, "don't let your situation take away from your future goals and endeavors."

JIM HEATH

Jim served the Newport News Apprentice School for sixteen years as Sports Information Director. He also worked for fifteen years as the Sports Information Director for the United States Collegiate Athletic Association developing websites for the association as well as introducing the use of live stats for national tournaments. Jim served as the Sports Information Director for Hampton University for seven years. He is an active member of College Sports Information Directors of America and Virginia Sports Information Directors where he served four years as President of this organization.

TOMMY THOMAS

The past thirty-one years, Tommy has been coaching volleyball between high school and club teams. The last twenty-one years has been at Peninsula Catholic High School. At Peninsula Catholic, he has accumulated a record of 356 and 11, with 3 state championships, 2 state runner-up, 7 conference championships, 6 conference coach of the year and 3 state coach of the year awards. His club travel teams have over 500 wins and has finished in the tip 50 in the nation 3 times.

JEAN BEALL

Jean has been with the Tribe athletic department for more than forty-four years and describes her job duties as "everything." She is mainly responsible for raising scholarship money for student-athletes. In 1977 it was hard to raise \$250,000 and now she is involved in raising \$5,000,000 annually. Among other things she prepares practice hard copies for coaches, and student term papers, and is a major connection between William and Mary athletics and the community. Jean was involved in creating the HEYFARL organization to raise money for scholarships for walk-on football players. Jean was awarded honorary alumni status from William and Mary in 2010 which is one of the highest honors bestowed to someone that did not attend William and Mary.

As a former player, NFL player, assistant and head football coach at Hampton, executive director of Job Education Training Corps and the program Hampton Opportunity Program for Enhancement. He served as Assistant Athletic Director for three years before becoming the Director of Operations for Athletics with emphasis in fundraising. Don plays a major part in the smooth running of the Hampton University Athletic Department.

BILLY BARNES

Billy was an outstanding basketball player at William and Mary and has spent the past twenty-nine years as boys' basketball coach at Walsingham Academy. He has over 500 victories and has won the regular season and Tidewater Conference Tournament titles several times. Billy will be greatly missed as he was a major influence for the entire school.

KYLE NEVE

Kyle has spent twenty-seven years as a NCAA basketball official, seven years as a coach in Surry County, twenty-one years at Bruton High with eight years as Athletic Director, and eight years at Lafayette High with five as Athletic director. Serving as a public-school teacher and administrator for thirty-eight years, Kyle has influenced the lives of many students, athletes, and coaches in a positive way.

LUCY AND RANDALL STOWE

This husband-and-wife combination has served the sport of wrestling for a lifetime. Their involvement ranges from referee of wrestling matches, arranging schedules for tournaments and youth matches, making travel arrangements for teams to travel, thirty years involved with the VHSL wrestling events, held official positions such as secretary of the Peninsula Wrestling Association, Vice President for Virginia Challenge, and Commissioner/President for the Peninsula Youth Wrestling league. Their involvement is not limited to what has been mentioned. In 2019 both Lucy and Randall were presented a special Lifetime Award by the National Wrestling Hall of Fame.
